
You will need
Plastic bottle; water, Coke, Pepsi, Fanta etc
Two small sticks
Some string
Sharp scissors
Mixed Wild Bird Seed

B. Make a Ground Feeding Station

Sparrows are birds that usually feed on the ground. Use a flat bottomed

sieve.






Put two ___ thin square sticks underneath it, at the end, to keep it just off the ground. Put a large stone Small bric or some other weight to hold the sieve down. Cover the bottom with wild bird seed. If splash out and get a stainless steel sieve you will be able to wash it in the dishwasher and it wont rust. Place it where you can see it but in the open so cats cant sneak up on the birds.

C. Make a simple bird Table


To make the table top you need a flat piece of wood (you could use an old cupboard door). You need some thin stips of wood to go round the edge to



Decide where you want the table.
Position a fence post holder and push it right down



into the ground. Slide the post into the holder.



House Sparrows like to nest together> Here is an apartment nestbox that you could make or buy, 3 for the price of one.



SINGLE BOX

The roof can be screwed/nailed on but a rubber flap/strip across the back can work as a hinge.

Sometimes we put some blocks of wood on the underside of lid so it can be pushed into place.

6. Put on an outside wall, remember Sparrows like to nest under the roof so they are not afraid of heights. 3 metres high minimum and not over a window if you don't want to fall out with your window cleaner! Try to choose a wall you can see from inside the house?

HINTS and TIPS

- 1. The thickness of the wood is important because it keeps the box and the eggs/chicks cool when sun is out and warm when its not. Use good wood (exterior-quality plywood or,hardwoods (such as oak and beech) or soft wood (such as pine. Pine is ok but wont last as long.
- 2. Try to cut accurately so the peices fit well together.
- 3. Nail or screw the pieces together. If you screw it has the advantage of allowing you to change a section should rot or become damaged.
- 4. The hole should be 32mm across but don't be suprised if the House Sparrows make some adjustments, they like things just right.
